

2010 Early Childhood Community Profile Summary sheet for the Shire of Alpine

Local demographics for young children aged 0 to 8 years and their families.¹

- There were 109 births notified to the local Maternal and Child Health services in Alpine during 2008-09. This represents a decrease of 35.8 per cent since 2006-07 and a decrease of 12.8 per cent since 2000-01. This compares to an increase in birth notifications across Victoria of 2.3 per cent since 2006-07 and 18.6 per cent since 2000-01.
- At 30 June 2008, there was an estimated 12,690 people residing in Alpine. Of these, 1,292 were aged between 0 to 8 years, representing 10.2 per cent of Alpine's total population.
- The population aged 0 to 8 years in Alpine is projected to decrease by 0.6 per cent by 2026, while the total population in Alpine is expected to increase by 12.5 per cent over this period.
- Using the Index of Relative Socioeconomic Disadvantage, Alpine was ranked 36 out of 79 LGAs in Victoria. A rank of 1 was assigned to the most disadvantaged LGA in Victoria.
- Of the 714 families with children aged between 0 and 8 years in Alpine, 83.8 per cent were couple families and 16.2 per cent were one parent families.
- There were 61 Aboriginal persons in Alpine, representing 0.5 per cent of the total population. 19.7 per cent of the Aboriginal population in Alpine were aged 0 to 8 years.

Health, learning, wellbeing, development and safety indicators for children in the local area.²

- 67.4 per cent of infants in Alpine were fully breastfed at 3 months and 37.5 per cent of infants were fully breastfed at 6 months.
- 90.8 per cent of children in Alpine were fully immunised at 12-<15 months, 96.0 per cent were fully immunised at 24-<27 months and 80.3 per cent were fully immunised at 60-<63 months.
- 131 Prep children were surveyed in the Australian Early Development Index (AEDI) in Alpine during 2009. Of these, 14.5 per cent were vulnerable on one or more domains and 8.1 per cent were vulnerable on two or more domains.
- In 2008, 87.7% students enrolled in government schools in Alpine were achieving a reading accuracy score of 90% or more on Level 5 texts, 90.2% of Year 1 students were reading Level 15 texts with over 90% accuracy and 96.0% of Year 2 students were achieving 90% accuracy or higher on Level 20 texts.

Families in Alpine.

- Based on the 2009 VCHWS survey results, 47.2% of children aged 6 months to 12 years were reported to have been read to almost every day in the Hume region. This was less than, but not significantly different to the proportion of children being read to almost every day across Victoria (48.3%).
- Based on the 2009 VCHWS, 4.3% of main carer's of children aged 0 to 12 years in the Hume region were classified as being of high risk of psychological distress. This proportion was higher, but not significantly different to that reported across Victoria (3.7%).
- In 2008 2009, 14 substantiated cases of child abuse were recorded in Alpine, representing a rate of 10.8 per 1,000 children aged 0 to 8 years in the area. This compares to a rate of 7.0 per 1000 children across Victoria.
- Over 2007 2008, the number of families with children aged 0 to 8 years in Alpine who remained in public housing 12 months or more after initial allocation was suppressed due to small numbers.



Indicators relating to the local community.³

- 95.6% of children aged 0 to 12 years in the Hume region were from households who reported being able to get support from friends, family and neighbours in times of crisis/need. This proportion was similar to the proportion reported across Victoria (95.2%).
- 97.3% of parents of children aged 0 to 12 years in the Hume region reported that having someone they could turn to for advice when having problems. This proportion was similar to the proportion reported across Victoria (97.1%).
- 96.0% of children aged 0 to 12 years in the Hume region were from households where the parent or guardian agreed that their neighbourhood was safe. This proportion was higher than, but not significantly different to the proportion reported across Victoria (95.1%).

Supports and services in Alpine.

- During 2008 2009, there were 13.4 hospital separations for gastroenteritis per 1,000 children aged 0 to 1 in Alpine. This is greater than the rate of hospital separations in Victoria (9.5 per 1,000 children aged under 1).
- In 2008 2009, 96.4 per cent of infants in Alpine received a home consulation visit and 72.4 per cent of children in Alpine attended the 3.5 year key ages and stages visit.
- The kindergarten participation rate in Alpine during 2009 was 98.3%. This was greater than the kindergarten participation rate in Victoria (92.7%).
- Prep students attending government schools in Alpine were absent for an average 17.4 days over the 2009 school year. Year 1 students were absent for an average 17.0 days and Year 2 students were absent for an average 17.0 days over the 2009 school year.

Early childhood services for families in Alpine.

- As at August 2010, there were 9 primary school education providers in Alpine 8 government, 1 Catholic and 0 independent.
- In 2009, there were 3 funded kindergarten programs in Alpine. Of these, none were kindergarten programs located within a long day care setting.
- As at 22 July 2010, Alpine had 2 multi-service Children's Centres completed or under development, funded by state and local government. These were:
