

2010 Early Childhood Community Profile Summary sheet for the City of Brimbank

Local demographics for young children aged 0 to 8 years and their families.¹

- There were 2,718 births notified to the local Maternal and Child Health services in Brimbank during 2008-09. This represents an increase of 7.0 per cent since 2006-07 and an increase of 12.0 per cent since 2000-01. This compares to an increase in birth notifications across Victoria of 2.3 per cent since 2006-07 and 18.6 per cent since 2000-01.
- At 30 June 2008, there was an estimated 181,115 people residing in Brimbank. Of these, 21,208 were aged between 0 to 8 years, representing 11.7 per cent of Brimbank's total population.
- The population aged 0 to 8 years in Brimbank is projected to decrease by 4.6 per cent by 2026, while the total population in Brimbank is expected to increase by 11.4 per cent over this period.
- Using the Index of Relative Socioeconomic Disadvantage, Brimbank was ranked 3 out of 79 LGAs in Victoria. A rank of 1 was assigned to the most disadvantaged LGA in Victoria.
- Of the 12,483 families with children aged between 0 and 8 years in Brimbank, 76.4 per cent were couple families and 23.6 per cent were one parent families.
- There were 571 Aboriginal persons in Brimbank, representing 0.3 per cent of the total population. 20.3 per cent of the Aboriginal population in Brimbank were aged 0 to 8 years.

Health, learning, wellbeing, development and safety indicators for children in the local area.²

- 36.4 per cent of infants in Brimbank were fully breastfed at 3 months and 26.4 per cent of infants were fully breastfed at 6 months.
- 92.3 per cent of children in Brimbank were fully immunised at 12-<15 months, 94.3 per cent were fully immunised at 24-<27 months and 85.9 per cent were fully immunised at 60-<63 months.
- 2,222 Prep children were surveyed in the Australian Early Development Index (AEDI) in Brimbank during 2009. Of these, 26.9 per cent were vulnerable on one or more domains and 12.4 per cent were vulnerable on two or more domains.
- In 2008, 72.6% students enrolled in government schools in Brimbank were achieving a reading accuracy score of 90% or more on Level 5 texts, 81.3% of Year 1 students were reading Level 15 texts with over 90% accuracy and 91.9% of Year 2 students were achieving 90% accuracy or higher on Level 20 texts.

Families in Brimbank.

- Based on the 2009 VCHWS survey results, 52.3% of children aged 6 months to 12 years were reported to have been read to almost every day in the Western Metropolitan region. This was more than, but not significantly different to the proportion of children being read to almost every day across Victoria (48.3%).
- Based on the 2009 VCHWS, 4.0% of main carer's of children aged 0 to 12 years in the Western Metropolitan region were classified as being of high risk of psychological distress. This proportion was higher, but not significantly different to that reported across Victoria (3.7%).
- In 2008 2009, 115 substantiated cases of child abuse were recorded in Brimbank, representing a rate of 5.4 per 1,000 children aged 0 to 8 years in the area. This compares to a rate of 7.0 per 1000 children across Victoria.
- Over 2007 2008, 100.0% of families with children aged 0 to 8 in Brimbank remained in public housing 12 months or more after initial allocation. This was greater than the percentage in Victoria (87.3%).



Indicators relating to the local community.3

- 92.9% of children aged 0 to 12 years in the Western Metropolitan region were from households who reported being able to get support from friends, family and neighbours in times of crisis/need. This proportion was similar to the proportion reported across Victoria (95.2%).
- 95.8% of parents of children aged 0 to 12 years in the Western Metropolitan region reported that having someone they could turn to for advice when having problems. This proportion was lower than, but not significantly different to the proportion reported across Victoria (97.1%).
- 92.6% of children aged 0 to 12 years in the Western Metropolitan region were from households where the parent or guardian agreed that their neighbourhood was safe. This proportion was lower than, but not significantly different to the proportion reported across Victoria (95.1%).

Supports and services in Brimbank.

- During 2008 2009, there were 13.8 hospital separations for gastroenteritis per 1,000 children aged 0 to 1 in Brimbank. This is greater than the rate of hospital separations in Victoria (9.5 per 1,000 children aged under 1).
- In 2008 2009, 98.6 per cent of infants in Brimbank received a home consulation visit and 41.8 per cent of children in Brimbank attended the 3.5 year key ages and stages visit.
- The kindergarten participation rate in Brimbank during 2009 was 90.4%. This was less than the kindergarten participation rate in Victoria (92.7%).
- Prep students attending government schools in Brimbank were absent for an average 17.2 days over the 2009 school year. Year 1 students were absent for an average 16.5 days and Year 2 students were absent for an average 15.8 days over the 2009 school year.

Early childhood services for families in Brimbank.

- As at August 2010, there were 46 primary school education providers in Brimbank 29 government, 15 Catholic and 2 independent.
- In 2009, there were 48 funded kindergarten programs in Brimbank. Of these, 14 were kindergarten programs located within a long day care setting.
- As at 22 July 2010, Brimbank had 2 multi-service Children's Centres completed or under development, funded by state and local government. These were:
