Open exclusively to female and gender diverse students, the event fosters a welcoming and enthusiastic atmosphere with engaging displays, supportive discussions and an array of career opportunities.

Hosted by the Department of Education, the Trade & Tech Fit expo connects students directly to industry, helping them to consider a wider range of study and employment pathways and broaden their ambitions.

It is the largest event of its kind in Victoria, welcoming over 3,700 female and gender diverse students from more than 140 schools in 2025. Through hands-on workshops, high-tech simulations, expert talks and stimulating conversations with industry professionals, students get direct exposure to economically in-demand industries across STEM and trade sectors.

18 new exhibitors signed on in 2025 alone, focussing on in-demand skills that meet student desires as well as the needs of the Victorian economy.
