Grace's road from law student to auto apprentice

While studying a Bachelor of Law/Commerce at Deakin University, Grace Jamieson realised what she really wanted to be was a mechanic.

However, before Grace made the move from university student to apprentice, she thought it wise to taste what a career as a mechanic would be like, and enrolled in a pre-apprenticeship course (Certificate II in Automotive Studies (Mechanical) at Bendigo Kangan Institute (BKI). She believed the course would also increase her chances of an apprenticeship offer.

Her instincts to be a mechanic turned out to be reality. She was successful in securing an apprenticeship at South Yarra BMW and they allowed her to nominate the TAFE she wished to attend. "I chose BKI again because I had such a great experience there and the facilities at the Automotive Centre of Excellence had been recently upgraded and were world class," she says.

After completing a Certificate III in Light Vehicle Mechanical Technology, Grace, who was named 2016 BMW Apprentice of the Year, was offered a Service Technician position at Tesla.

"Now that I have completed my apprenticeship I am interested in enrolling in further education at TAFE, in particular Certificate IV in Training and Assessment so I can further my skills in mentoring and get a head start in finding opportunities to progress to an official mentoring role," she says.
