We are pleased to provide the Victorian Registration and Qualifications Authority (VRQA) with this Statement of Expectations (SOE), which applies from 1 July 2019 to 30 June 2021 unless otherwise amended.

Improving the administration and enforcement of regulation

As Minister for Education, Minister for Training and Skills and Minister for Higher Education, alongside the Minister for Jobs, Innovation and Trade, we are responsible for administering the *Education and Training Reform Act 2006* (the Act), which provides for a high standard of education and training for all Victorian students, including by setting out the functions and powers of the VRQA. This SOE should be read in the context of the objectives, obligations and functions outlined in the Act.

We acknowledge the critical role that the VRQA plays as the regulator of education and training providers in Victoria. We recognise the VRQA's achievement in progressing the expectations set out in the previous SOE issued on 9 January 2018, including the successful implementation of home schooling regulations and supporting school expulsion reforms in government schools.

We recognise the joint work between the Department of Education and Training (DET) and VRQA to roll out the Head Start initiative, providing greater opportunities for school students to undertake apprenticeships and traineeships.

Additionally, we acknowledge the work of the VRQA in responding to the McClellan *Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse* in relation to boarding facilities and the VRQA's efforts to embed the child safe standards in Victorian schools. We also note that the Victorian Auditor-General's Office (VAGO) has recently released its report into *School compliance with Victoria's child safe standards*. The report has identified a range of recommendations to better support schools to comply with the standards and emphasised the need for the VRQA to play a stronger regulatory role in defining a consistent compliance framework for implementation of the Child Safe Standards, including compliance with Ministerial Order No. 870.



The DET Statement of Expectations Evaluation Report: VRQA SOE 2018-2019 demonstrates progress in the provision of compliance-related information for schools relating to the standards, as well as opportunities for continuous improvement. There have also been improvements in the identification of contract training risks for Victorian apprentices and trainees.

We also acknowledge the VRQA's ongoing role in supporting the Government's Education State reform agenda. This SOE letter supports the VRQA to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of regulatory activities and to initiate and maintain ongoing collaboration with other agencies including DET, the Victorian Skills Commissioner, Local Jobs First Commissioner, Labour Hire Commissioner and WorkSafe. We also expect the VRQA will continue to support and advise the Government's policy agenda as appropriate, including (but not limited to) the implementation of the 'Quality apprenticeships to drive job opportunities in the modern economy' 2018-19 Budget initiative, Trade Papers and DET-led work to implement the 'Higher apprenticeships' 2019-20 Budget initiative.

Improvements and targets

Attachment A of this letter outlines priority governance and performance objectives aimed at continuous improvement in the administration and enforcement of regulation. These expectations are based on consultation between DET and the VRQA and also on the findings from the Statement of Expectations Evaluation Report: VRQA SOE 2018-2019. In responding to these expectations, the VRQA should consider the implications of the VAGO findings and other relevant reviews that may impact the administration and enforcement of regulation such as the Victorian Government's Response to the McClellan Royal Commission and the Department of Health and Human Services Review of the child safe standards.

Reporting

We note that as part of the Statement of Expectations Framework for Regulators, departmental evaluation of regulatory performance against the SOE and public reporting against performance objectives in Attachment A is mandatory. We expect that the VRQA will continue to consistently collect and publish the relevant baseline data found in the *Statement of Expectations Evaluation Report: VRQA SOE 2018-2019* to facilitate future evaluations unless otherwise agreed, as well as any new data required to effectively evaluate this SOE. This data should also be published in the annual report as part of the progress reporting against the SOE and incorporated in the VRQA Strategic Plan. The VRQA should also consider other measures in addition to those in Attachment A to improve and support regulatory activities and ensure that the findings are representative of schools across all sectors.

We thank you for your ongoing, important work in supporting Victoria to build a world class education system, and we look forward to receiving the VRQA's response.
