


The Path I Take

My Home by the sea

The gum leaves a symbol of welcome for the local traditional owner group, The Boon Wurrung People on whose land I have been fortunate enough to be born and raised on. The gum leaf is a mark of respect and acknowledgment of their elders who show me the way. The colours represent, the blues of the waters and sky, the vivid oranges and yellows of the sands, and the green of the beautiful bush that surrounds us. The dots acknowledge my ancestors and white lines showing our journey across this country.



The Finke River

Is a painting of where my ancestors where born. My mother's great grandma was born on the banks of the Finke river. Although I've never been to country, I've looked at the way the river is shaped over the country and I dream of going and seeing the land on which my ancestors were born. With this painting I pay tribute to my home country. The blue dots showing the movement of the river, with people, meeting places, seeds that surround the river, the different colour sections represent all the different colours of country you'll find across Australia.



By The Water (2021)

Acrylic on canvas, framed in locally sustainably sourced raw oak - The lines and colours that flow across the canvas represent the water which bring life. Under the stars our people and animals to live harmoniously together.



Woman and child (2021)

Framed, Acrylic on canvas - Commissioned artwork that tells the story of a woman and child who live by the water, but journeyed from Queensland, the vibrant purple flowers are the state flower of Queensland, the Cooktown Orchid.



Kangaroo Country (2021)

Acrylic on canvas - Signifying strength, the kangaroo looks out onto the country, where we connect and heal ourselves and our loved ones.

Connection To Country (2020)

The mountains represent the Gariwerd (Grampians) and the water represents the Wimmera River. Important parts of the land we live around and both have a Dreamtime story around the Mekong of them. The animals represent the kids Nyupun animals that were given to them by local elders. You can also see a man in a cave with his fire, clap sticks, didgeridoo, spear and cave art.

Tanisha is an artist and Aboriginal Youth Leader, who in 2019 was awarded the 'Regional Development Victoria Leadership and Innovation Award'.
