



# 2010 Early Childhood Community Profile

## Summary sheet for the City of Greater Shepparton

### Local demographics for young children aged 0 to 8 years and their families.<sup>1</sup>

- There were 877 births notified to the local Maternal and Child Health services in Greater Shepparton during 2008-09. This represents a decrease of 3.6 per cent since 2006-07 and an increase of 4.9 per cent since 2000-01. This compares to an increase in birth notifications across Victoria of 2.3 per cent since 2006-07 and 18.6 per cent since 2000-01.
- At 30 June 2008, there was an estimated 61,014 people residing in Greater Shepparton. Of these, 7,551 were aged between 0 to 8 years, representing 12.4 per cent of Greater Shepparton's total population.
- The population aged 0 to 8 years in Greater Shepparton is projected to increase by 10.8 per cent by 2026, while the total population in Greater Shepparton is expected to increase by 20.8 per cent over this period.
- Using the Index of Relative Socioeconomic Disadvantage, Greater Shepparton was ranked 19 out of 79 LGAs in Victoria. A rank of 1 was assigned to the most disadvantaged LGA in Victoria.
- Of the 4,221 families with children aged between 0 and 8 years in Greater Shepparton, 77.2 per cent were couple families and 22.8 per cent were one parent families.
- There were 1,819 Aboriginal persons in Greater Shepparton, representing 3.2 per cent of the total population. 23.8 per cent of the Aboriginal population in Greater Shepparton were aged 0 to 8 years.

### Health, learning, wellbeing, development and safety indicators for children in the local area.<sup>2</sup>

- 45.5 per cent of infants in Greater Shepparton were fully breastfed at 3 months and 34.2 per cent of infants were fully breastfed at 6 months.
- 89.6 per cent of children in Greater Shepparton were fully immunised at 12-<15 months, 95.6 per cent were fully immunised at 24-<27 months and 79.3 per cent were fully immunised at 60-<63 months.
- 792 Prep children were surveyed in the Australian Early Development Index (AEDI) in Greater Shepparton during 2009. Of these, 23.7 per cent were vulnerable on one or more domains and 12.7 per cent were vulnerable on two or more domains.
- In 2008, 74.2% students enrolled in government schools in Greater Shepparton were achieving a reading accuracy score of 90% or more on Level 5 texts, 81.5% of Year 1 students were reading Level 15 texts with over 90% accuracy and 91.1% of Year 2 students were achieving 90% accuracy or higher on Level 20 texts.

### Families in Greater Shepparton.

- Based on the 2009 VCHWS survey results, 47.2% of children aged 6 months to 12 years were reported to have been read to almost every day in the Hume region. This was less than, but not significantly different to the proportion of children being read to almost every day across Victoria (48.3%).
- Based on the 2009 VCHWS, 4.3% of main carer's of children aged 0 to 12 years in the Hume region were classified as being of high risk of psychological distress. This proportion was higher, but not significantly different to that reported across Victoria (3.7%).
- In 2008 - 2009, 99 substantiated cases of child abuse were recorded in Greater Shepparton, representing a rate of 13.1 per 1,000 children aged 0 to 8 years in the area. This compares to a rate of 7.0 per 1000 children across Victoria.
- Over 2007 - 2008, 87.7% of families with children aged 0 to 8 in Greater Shepparton remained in public housing 12 months or more after initial allocation. This was similar to the percentage in Victoria (87.3%).



### Indicators relating to the local community.<sup>3</sup>

- 95.6% of children aged 0 to 12 years in the Hume region were from households who reported being able to get support from friends, family and neighbours in times of crisis/need. This proportion was similar to the proportion reported across Victoria (95.2%).
- 97.3% of parents of children aged 0 to 12 years in the Hume region reported that having someone they could turn to for advice when having problems. This proportion was similar to the proportion reported across Victoria (97.1%).
- 96.0% of children aged 0 to 12 years in the Hume region were from households where the parent or guardian agreed that their neighbourhood was safe. This proportion was higher than, but not significantly different to the proportion reported across Victoria (95.1%).

### Supports and services in Greater Shepparton.

- During 2008 - 2009, there were 14.1 hospital separations for gastroenteritis per 1,000 children aged 0 to 1 in Greater Shepparton. This is greater than the rate of hospital separations in Victoria (9.5 per 1,000 children aged under 1) .
- In 2008 - 2009, 98.9 per cent of infants in Greater Shepparton received a home consultation visit and 62.9 per cent of children in Greater Shepparton attended the 3.5 year key ages and stages visit.
- The kindergarten participation rate in Greater Shepparton during 2009 was 93.6%. This was greater than the kindergarten participation rate in Victoria (92.7%).
- Prep students attending government schools in Greater Shepparton were absent for an average 13.2 days over the 2009 school year. Year 1 students were absent for an average 15.6 days and Year 2 students were absent for an average 14.5 days over the 2009 school year.

### Early childhood services for families in Greater Shepparton.

- As at August 2010, there were 36 primary school education providers in Greater Shepparton - 28 government, 5 Catholic and 3 independent.
- In 2009, there were 27 funded kindergarten programs in Greater Shepparton. Of these, 6 were kindergarten programs located within a long day care setting.
- As at 22 July 2010, Greater Shepparton had 1 multi-service Children's Centres completed or under development, funded by state and local government. These were:
