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Expelling a child from school



This document is about what happens when a principal is thinking about expelling a child.

We call it an **expulsion**.



An expulsion is when the principal tells your child to:

- leave the school
- never come back.



For a principal to think about expelling your child, something really bad must have happened while your child was:

- at school
- going to or from school
- taking part in a school activity.



Your child might have:





- put another person's health, safety or wellbeing at risk
- kept doing something that put another person at risk after your child was told not to



 damaged or destroyed another person's property





 taken something that does not belong to them

 brought a weapon or illegal drugs to school





 used or sold a weapon or illegal drugs while they were at school



 done or said things over and over again to put another person down



 made it really hard for other children to learn.



Your child will be expelled if the principal decides it's the only way to make sure other students and staff are healthy and safe.



What will the principal do?



- If a principal is thinking about expelling your child, they will:
 - find out as much as they can about what has happened



• tell you what has happened



ask you to take part in a Behaviour
 Support and Intervention Meeting

• think about all the information in this situation





 make sure your child has support at school



 think about ways to support your child so they can stay at their school



 decide if expelling your child is the only way to make sure other students and staff are healthy and safe.



Support for your child



You know a lot about your child and what can cause changes in their behaviour.


If you share this information with the school, it could:



 help the school work out how to help your child



 stop any problems from getting worse.




There are things schools should do before expulsion becomes an option.



The school should:



develop a Behaviour Support Plan
 for your child – a plan which tells
 your child's teacher and school staff
 how to keep your child safe and look
 after their wellbeing



to support your child at school.





 work with your child to solve problems they have

offer your child the support they need.



How can you support your child?

Your child might show signs that they need some extra support, such as:



• sleeping a lot or not sleeping well



• using drugs or drinking alcohol



• having big changes in their moods



• getting very angry





- crying a lot

 not taking much care with the way they look



 staying away from their friends, family or people that help them



 not doing things they normally like to do.

Behaviour Support and Intervention Meetings



The principal must hold a **Behaviour Support and Intervention Meeting** before they decide to expel a child from school.

The meeting will include:

- you and your child
- the principal
- other staff at the school who have supported your child
- a Regional Approved Support
 Person someone who works for the Department and knows a lot about student wellbeing.

The meeting will give you a chance to:



 find out why your child might be expelled



 talk about your child's side of the story and be heard





 share any information that could help the principal make a decision



- talk about ways to:
 - \circ keep your child at the school
 - o support your child



 talk about other learning and training options your child might have if they are expelled.



The decision about your child's expulsion won't be made until after this meeting.



If you need an interpreter, the school can organise one for you.





If you can't go to the meeting, you can choose someone who you trust to go in your place.

In this case, you will need to fill out a Relevant Person Nomination form.

If you do not have someone who you trust to go in your place the school will find someone.



This person will be at the meeting to:

- tell your child's side of the story
- support your child.



Bringing a support person



You can bring a support person to the meeting if you need one.



This should be someone you trust.



The support person can't be someone you have to pay to be there.



If your child has a disability, you might choose a support person who knows and understands their needs.





You might choose a support person who knows and understands your:

- culture
- religion.

The support person can:



• help you get ready for the meeting



• go to the meeting and support you



 make sure you and your child understand your rights



 make sure the school follows the right processes





 listen to any questions or concerns you have



 help you work out what result you and your child want



 help you work out what you will do if your child is expelled



 make sure you have all the paperwork you need



 support you if you want to appeal the decision that is made – this means asking for the principal's decision to be reviewed





 support your child if they must move to a new school.

It is not your support person's job to:



• make a decision for you



• support us or the school.

Older children





If your child is 18 or older, they might choose to speak for themselves.

The law understands that some children younger than 18 can make their own decisions. We call these children **mature minors**.



The principal will work out if a child:

- is a mature minor
- can make decisions during the expulsion process.



If your child says it's ok, you can still:

- support them
- go to meetings.



The school will encourage your child to get support from:

- you
- a carer
- a support person
- a person who will be on their side.



Making a decision



The principal must tell you what they have decided within 2 working days of the Behaviour Support and Intervention Meeting.



The Secretary of our department must approve any decision to expel a child aged 8 or younger.



In this case, we must tell you what the Secretary has decided within 10 working days of the Behaviour Support and Intervention Meeting.



It is important for your child to keep learning while the school is making a decision.





Your child might be given a **suspension**.

This means they will stay at home for a period of time.

The school will make sure they have work to do so they keep learning during this time.



If your child is suspended for longer than 1 week, a teacher from the school should be in regular contact to support them.



You should contact the school if this doesn't happen.



What decisions could be made?



The school might decide not to expel your child.



Your child will be given support to stay at the school.



If this is the case, you might take part in meetings to develop a Behaviour Support Plan for your child.

OR



The school might decide to expel your child.



If this is the case, the principal will give you:



- a Notice of Expulsion that explains the school's reasons for expelling your child
- an Expulsion Appeals Form that explains the rights you have if you don't agree.



Details:

The principal will help make your child's move to a new school as smooth as possible.



They will work with:

- members of our local Area team
- the Regional Engagement Coordinator.



They will write a plan for how they will support your child.





We call this the **supported transition plan**.




When they write this plan, they will think about your child's:

- likes
- interests
- skills.



They will also:

- talk to the new school
- give the new school information about your child
- make sure your child gets the right support.





The Regional Engagement Coordinator will check in with the new school after:

- 1 month
- 6 months.

They will talk to the local Area team if your child needs more support.



What if you don't agree with the school's decision?



You have the right to appeal the decision to expel your child from school.



If you appeal the school's decision, it will be reviewed.



We will think about and decide if your child will:

- stay at their school
- go to another school.



If you want to appeal, you must fill out the *Expulsion Appeals Form* and give it to the principal.





You must do this within 10 days of getting your child's *Notice of Expulsion*.


You can appeal the decision if:



 the school knew your child had behaviour problems but didn't do enough to support your child



 the reasons the school gave for expelling your child were not fair



 the principal didn't follow all the steps they were supposed to follow when they thought about expelling your child





 there was something going on in your child's life at the time of the behaviour that made a difference.



Your *Expulsion Appeals Form* will go to the Area Executive Director – a senior person who works for the Department in your region.



You might need to take part in another meeting. You can bring a support person if this happens.

Appeal

Asking for the principal's decision to be reviewed.

Behaviour Support Plan

Expulsion

Mature minors

Children younger than 18 who can make their own decisions.



Regional Approved Support Person

Someone who works for us and knows a lot about student wellbeing.





Regional Engagement Coordinator

Someone who works for the Department in your region.

You can talk to them if you have questions about an expulsion.

Student Support Group



A group that includes you, your child's teacher and support people from your child's school.

The group meets to plan ways to support your child at school.



Supported transition plan

A plan for how your child will be supported as they move to a new school.



Suspension

Your child might be asked not to attend school for a period of time.
