


Rules to make school safe.

We call it respectful behaviour.




Victorian schools have rules.

There are rules to say how people must treat each other.



The rules are for

students



and





You work with the school



Parents and school staff work together.

This makes school a good place to be for each person.



The rules help you

- feel safe
- be respected
- to feel part of your school.



The rules help your child to learn.





You must know how to treat other people at school. Like

• in the class room



in the play ground



- in meetings
- in staff offices.





It is also other places to do with school like

- school camps
- school trips
- when you learn from home.



Each person helps to make school a safe place.



There are more rules for staff too.

It is called the Respectful Workplaces Policy.

The rules



The rules say

- what are good things to do
- what are **not** good things to do.



The rules say

- to listen to each other
- to give each person time to speak
- help each other with what you need
- be polite to other people.

Schools call this **respectful behaviour**.



Some things you can do

Parents help make schools a good place.

They do this when they

- are polite
- follow the school rules
- work with the school to fix any problems.





Do this each time you talk to staff. Like

• face to face



- on the phone
- in a text message.



Also do this when you

• write a letter




• in an email



• on social media.



Some things you must not do



All staff must feel safe at school.



Do **not** be rude to staff.

Do **not** swear at staff.

Do **not** tell people you will hurt staff.



Do **not** hurt other people.

Like do **not** hit some one.

Do **not** break things.

Like do **not** punch a hole in the wall.

There are words you must **not** say about staff.

You can **not** say bad things about staff who are



- a person who is
 - gay
 - lesbian
 - transgender
 - LGBTIQ+



• a person from a different country



a person from a different religion.



You can **not** say bad things to staff.

Like you say

- they can **not** do their job
- they do **not** belong.



Because of their

• gender. Like they are a woman



• race. Like they are from another country



disability.



Some things staff must do

Staff must

- treat each person with respect. Like
 - all children feel part of their class
 - all families feel part of the school.



Staff must

make sure you feel OK.

Staff will help you feel part of your school.



There is a problem



You are **not** happy with some thing.



Like staff

• did **not** listen to you



• did **not** respect you



• your child is **not** happy at school.



You tell the school about your problem.

We call it a complaint.



We want to hear from you.



It tells us

- what we need to do better
- how we can do better.





You need a translator.

You may need to go to a meeting.

 - an email.




Some times the school needs to talk to the police.


