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### **Preface**

### This report presents:

- information collected from the Census of students from language backgrounds other than English conducted in all government schools in August 1997;
- new arrivals data for the period 1 November 1996 to 31 October 1997;
- information collected in the English as a Second Language (ESL) Survey completed in August 1997 by all schools in receipt of ESL Index funding in their 1997 school global budget.

The first section provides an overview of data relating to students from language backgrounds other than English and sets a context for the following two sections.

The second section provides information on ESL provision for newly arrived students in intensive ESL programs.

The third section provides information on service provision to students from language backgrounds other than English in mainstream schools.

### **Regional Changes**

As a result of the restructuring of the metropolitan regional boundaries, the North West Metropolitan Region and the South East Metropolitan Region became four regions in 1997: Southern Metropolitan Region, Northern Metropolitan Region, Western Metropolitan Region, and Eastern Metropolitan Region. The data presented in this report represent the new regional boundaries. The non-metropolitan regions remain unchanged.

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# STUDENTS FROM LANGUAGE BACKGROUNDS OTHER THAN ENGLISH

In 1997, 123 020 students in government schools (23.7 per cent) were from language backgrounds other than English. Of these, 3207 were newly arrived in Australia. More than 70 languages were spoken in their homes.


The Department of Education (Office of Schools) defines a student as having a language background other than English if either the student or one or both parents were born in a non-English speaking country. The term 'language background other than English' is considered to relate to both cultural and linguistic aspects of students' backgrounds. Of this broad group, 35.5 per cent met the criteria for English as a Second Language (ESL) funding, that is, English was not the main language spoken at home and they had been enrolled in an Australian school for less than 7 years.

Extending services to government school students for whom English is a second language was a Victorian Government priority in 1997. Included in these services was the provision of specific ESL programs aimed to improve the educational opportunities and outcomes of these students. The ESL support provided includes:

- ESL for newly arrived students in intensive programs
- ESL support for students in mainstream schools.

### Students' Language Backgrounds

Figure 1 below is based on data collected in the Language Background Other Than English student census and shows the percentage distribution of the main language spoken in the homes of students from language backgrounds other than English.

# **Support Services for Students from Language Backgrounds other than English**

A range of services, including English as a Second Language provision, is provided to schools to support students from language backgrounds other than English. Data is also collected to assist in planning services for ESL students.

### **Support for Students**

### ESL New Arrivals

Newly arrived students are able to attend English Language Schools and Centres (ELS/Cs) which provide intensive English language instruction. Outposting services from these schools and centres also enable primary new arrivals to receive an intensive English language program in a school setting. The Geelong English Language Program also provides ESL support to new arrivals in the Geelong area. A new initiative for 1997 was the provision of funding to a number of schools with isolated new arrivals through the Isolated ESL Student Support Program. Funding was also provided to the Shepparton district in Term 4, 1997 to pilot a program that supported new arrivals enrolled in schools in the area. Refer to 'ESL for New Arrivals' (page 13) for more details.

### ESL General Support

ESL students in mainstream settings are able to continue their learning of English through the provision of programs provided by ESL teachers in mainstream schools. Refer to 'General Support Programs for ESL in Mainstream Schools' (page 23) for more details.

### Interpreting and Translating Services

It is Government policy that government departments and agencies provide interpreting and translating services to clients from language backgrounds other than English, as appropriate, to ensure that all Victorians have equal access to information. The Department of Education provides government schools with free access to interpreting and translating services, provided their use is within the guidelines developed by the Department of Education.

Both on-site and telephone interpreting are available to government schools. Interpreters are provided for the following:

- parent-teacher interviews
- individual student counselling and discipline
- information dissemination.

A total of 349 schools requested on-site interpreters for 5116 assignments during 1997, an increase of 303 assignments on 1996. On-site interpreting makes up 72 per cent of interpreting and translating work in government schools. Interpreters were provided in 60 different languages. Telephone interpreting was used by 42 schools in 42 languages for 952 assignments,

an increase of 677 assignments on 1996. Telephone interpreting makes up 13 per cent of all interpreting and translating work in government schools.

Schools can request translations for the following:

- · key items for newsletters
- · notices to parents
- information on programs/activities.

A total of 100 schools requested 1065 items to be translated in 47 different languages during 1997. This was an increase of 437 items on 1996 and made up 15 per cent of all interpreting and translating work in government schools. Refer to Appendix 1 for interpreting and translations assignments by language.

### Multicultural Education Aide (MEA) Funding

Funding for MEAs to work with teachers and assist parents and students with language, cultural and educational issues is provided to all ELS/Cs and a number of mainstream schools. Refer to 'Multicultural Education Aides' (page 30) for more details.

### Support for Teachers of ESL Learners

### Curriculum Support

The preparation of curriculum materials to assist both ESL specialists and mainstream teachers continued to be a priority for School Programs Division in 1997.

The LOTE, ESL and Multicultural Education Branch produced ESL Course Advice for secondary new arrivals at Stages S1 and S2 in 1997. The final components of ESL Course Advice, primary post new arrivals Stages A2, B2 and B3, and secondary post new arrival Stages S3 and S4, were produced in draft form for trialing and revising. A pamphlet giving parents information about the Curriculum and Standards Framework (CSF) was produced and translated into 15 languages, and the booklet, *Preparing for the VCE—information for newly arrived students learning English as a second language and their parents* was also translated into 15 languages. The publication *Beginning ESL—support material for primary new arrivals* was also completed in 1997.

### **Professional Development**

A range of professional development activities was provided in 1997, including ESL training courses, ESL in the Mainstream, and workshops held at the Languages and Multicultural Education Resources Centre (LMERC).

*Credit bearing ESL courses:* thirteen teachers were supported to undertake courses provided by Melbourne University. In selecting teachers to be supported, priority was given to primary teachers working in an ESL program.

ESL in the Mainstream (ESLM) Teacher Development Course: three new ESL in the Mainstream tutors were trained in metropolitan and country areas and fifteen courses organised and conducted. ESLM is a professional development course for ESL and mainstream classroom teachers.

Developed by the Education Department of South Australia, the course outlines collaborative approaches to meeting the needs of ESL students in primary and secondary mainstream classrooms.

LMERC activities: each term the ESL project officers based at LMERC provide professional development activities, including cultural background sessions, classroom strategies to assist teachers meet the needs of ESL learners, and workshops to assist schools better understand and implement the ESL Companion to the English CSF. The majority of these were conducted after school hours. ESL project officers at LMERC also coordinated a professional development course on Working with Adolescents Suffering the Effects of Trauma which was conducted by Foundation House. There were 19 participants in the course.

*ESL networks:* Teachers of ESL learners also had access to professional development arranged through regional ESL networks and through activities offered during the four 'ESL Weeks' organised by, and held in each of the four metropolitan regions.

#### Advice and Resources

The two ESL project officers based at LMERC also provided assistance to teachers in the implementation of policies and programs to support ESL learners.

#### **Data Collection**

In order to maintain accurate statistical records on students for whom English is a second language for planning and funding purposes and for State and Commonwealth accountability requirements, the Department of Education collects the following data:

### Language Background Other Than English Census

The census provides detailed information on students from language backgrounds other than English who are enrolled in government schools in Victoria. The census is completed by all schools in August each year. ESL Index Funding for the following year is based on this census.

### New Arrivals Data Collection

The Department of Education collects data on newly arrived students twice a year in accordance with Commonwealth requirements.

### ESL Survey

The ESL survey, conducted annually in June by the ESL Section, seeks information from all schools in receipt of ESL Index Funding and provides a profile of student types and information on ESL programs operating in government schools.

### The Languages and Multicultural Education Resources Centre

The Languages and Multicultural Education Resources Centre (LMERC) supports a number of LOTE, ESL and multicultural initiatives and provides an up-to-date collection of materials on LOTE, ESL and multicultural education available for borrowing by schools.

### The Development and Launch of the Multicultural Policy for Victorian Schools

The *Multicultural Policy for Victorian Schools* was launched by the Minister for Education in November 1997.

The primary target of this policy is to ensure that by 2006, all students P-12 will have multicultural perspectives delivered across all eight key learning areas and incorporated into all aspects of school life.

A strategic implementation plan was also developed that includes the development and delivery of professional development, development of culturally inclusive units of work, an annotated bibliography, and other initiatives to support schools in implementing the policy.

### **ESL FOR NEW ARRIVALS**

Newly arrived ESL learners are defined as those who meet the eligibility criteria for Commonwealth per capita funding under the Commonwealth Programmes for Schools. They include permanent residents from language backgrounds other than English who enrol in an intensive ESL program within six months of their arrival in Australia if they are in Years 1 to 12, or within 18 months of arrival if they are in the preparatory year. In addition to those students who meet these criteria, there is a significant number of new arrivals eligible for enrolment in government schools who do not meet the residency criteria and require ESL support. A number of students on bridging visas seeking asylum are also provided with an intensive program providing they are eligible for enrolment in government schools.

A once-only per capita grant of \$3214 was provided by the Commonwealth Government in 1997 for each eligible newly arrived student. In addition, funding for all of the capital works (buildings and related facilities) for the program, as well as a range of grants and allowances, was provided by the State Government. In 1997, 3207 new arrivals enrolled in Victorian government schools, a decrease of 667, or 17.2 per cent from 1996. The majority, 2657, met the Commonwealth eligibility criteria, while the other 550 students did not meet the residency criterion. These students included Polynesian students on New Zealand passports and students on bridging or temporary visas. Students came from 117 countries and between them spoke more than 64 languages.





Figure 2 Country of origin of newly arrived students from language

The countries of origin of new arrival students vary from year to year and reflect world events. In 1997, the highest numbers of students came from China, Vietnam, Bosnia-Herzegovina, New Zealand, Sri Lanka and Hong Kong, as shown in Figure 2. The significant changes from 1996 included decreases in the number of students from China, (603 in 1996 to 298 in 1997), Bosnia-Herzegovina (341 in 1996 to 193 in 1997), Cambodia (206 in 1996 to 103 in 1997) and Timor (72 in 1996 to 28 in 1997). In 1997 there was a large number of students from New Zealand (157). It should be noted that a large number of students from Samoa and Tonga enter Australia on New Zealand passports. A more extensive list of countries and numbers of new arrival students for 1997 can be found in Appendix 2.




**Figure 3** Numbers of newly arrived students enrolled in government schools, by region, Victoria, 1997.

The majority of new arrival students (2999) were enrolled in schools in the four metropolitan regions. Small numbers were enrolled in schools in Barwon-South Western Region (70) and Goulburn North-Eastern Region (62), with the remaining students (76) spread across the other three non-metropolitan regions. The number of students enrolling in schools in regions other than the metropolitan and Barwon-South Western regions increased from 62 students in 1996 to 138 in 1997. Central Highland-Wimmera Region enrolled 7 new arrivals, Loddon Campaspe-Mallee enrolled 40 new arrivals, Goulburn North-Eastern enrolled 62 and Gippsland Region enrolled 29 new arrival students. Figure 3 shows the number of new arrival students enrolled in Victorian government schools in 1997, by region.

### Students' Language Backgrounds

The 3207 new arrival students spoke more than 64 languages in 1997. Chinese (Mandarin) with 326 students (down from 498 in 1996) was the language with the greatest number of students, followed by Vietnamese with 277 students (down from 303 students), Serbian with 192 students (down from 293 students), Chinese (Cantonese) with 164 students (down from 203 students) and Arabic with 159 students (down from 215 students).




Figure 5 government schools, Victoria, 1997.




Figure 6 Language backgrounds of new arrivals in Southern Metropolitan Region, government schools, Victoria, 1997.





Figure 7 Language backgrounds of new arrivals in Northern Metropolitan Region, government schools, Victoria, 1997.

The distribution of these students among the four metropolitan regions and the five non-metropolitan regions is shown in Figures 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12.



**Figure 4** Language backgrounds of new arrivals in Eastern Metropolitan Region, government schools, Victoria, 1997.

**Figure 8** Language backgrounds of new arrivals in Barwon-South Western Region, government schools, Victoria, 1997.





Figure 9 Language backgrounds of new arrivals in Central Highlands-Wimmera Region, government schools, Victoria, 1997.



**Figure 10** Language backgrounds of new arrivals in Loddon Campaspe-Mallee Region, government schools, Victoria, 1997.




Figure 11 Language backgrounds of new arrivals in Goulburn North-Eastern Region, government schools, Victoria, 1997.




Figure 12 schools, Victoria, 1997.

### **Programs for New Arrivals**

Newly arrived primary and secondary students from language backgrounds other than English ideally attend an intensive English language program at one of the English Language Schools and Centres. A number of primary students who are unable to attend an intensive program at an ELS/C have access to an outposting program. In addition, students in non-metropolitan regions and isolated metropolitan areas are catered for within the mainstream school with the assistance of a New Arrivals Kit and funding provided to schools through the Isolated ESL Student Support Program.

There are three broad categories of students catered for within the new arrivals program:

- permanent residents of Australia who attract Commonwealth funding
- temporary residents of Australia who do not attract Commonwealth funding but satisfy all Commonwealth eligibility criteria except for that of permanent residency
- permanent and temporary residents of Australia who fall outside the Commonwealth eligibility criteria in terms of length of time in Australia but are in need of intensive ESL support.

The following data refer to the first two categories of students; that is, permanent and temporary students enrolling within their eligibility period. It should be noted that the New Arrivals Program caters for the third category as well. In reporting on new arrivals, the Department of Education endeavours to account for all new arrivals enrolling in the current period.

### **English Language Schools and Centres**

There are 13 ELS/Cs in the metropolitan area. (Refer to Appendix 3 for details of the 3 ELSs, 10 ELCs.) These settings provide intensive English language instruction at both primary and secondary levels. In 1997, a total of 44.7 equivalent full time (EFT) primary teachers and 100.8 EFT secondary teachers catered for the needs of approximately 487 primary and 819 secondary students at any one time. The majority of students attended the ELS/C for two terms. The small classes and the high number of contact hours enable teachers to deliver an intensive program tailored to the differing needs of students, helping them to adapt as quickly as possible to the Australian education system and society. ESL is taught through the content areas of the Key Learning Areas.

Of the 3207 new arrival students, a total of 1261 (39.3 per cent) enrolled in ELS/Cs in 1997. Of these, 377 were primary students (20.0 per cent of the total number of primary new arrival students) and 884 were secondary students (66.8 per cent of the total number of secondary new arrival students).

### The Geelong English Language Program

A new arrivals program is provided in the Geelong area by a team of teachers working in the Geelong English Language Program. This program is based on a visiting teacher model. In 1997, 2.7 EFT primary teachers and 1.0 EFT secondary teacher provided a program to 24 primary students and

9 secondary students. (Refer to Appendix 3 for details of the Geelong English Language Program.)

### **ESL Outposted Services**

Outposting involves the assignment of primary teachers from an ELS/C to a mainstream primary school or a cluster of schools to provide an intensive new arrivals program for eligible newly arrived students for whom English is a second language. These students are unable to attend a program in an ELS/C because of the difficulties for young students travelling to one of the six primary settings in the metropolitan area. Students are grouped according to their stage of schooling and English language needs, and receive an intensive English language program for up to four days a week. The students remain enrolled in their host school and participate in its program when not in the intensive class.

In 1997, 237 new arrival students received an intensive program through outposting in 21 schools. This brought the total coverage of primary new arrivals through the New Arrivals Program in 1997 to 36.0 per cent.

### The Shepparton English Language Program

A new arrivals program was established in the Shepparton area in Term 4, 1997. This program operated within a cluster of schools, sharing teacher resources and providing a program to 33 primary and secondary students.

### **Isolated ESL Student Support Program**

Schools in non-metropolitan regions received targeted funding under the Isolated ESL Student Support Program to support new arrival students in their schools. In 1997, 17 primary students and 6 secondary students received support through this program.

#### **New Arrivals in Mainstream Schools**

The 31.4 per cent of secondary new arrival students and 64.0 per cent of primary new arrivals who did not attend an ELS/C or receive other specialist new arrivals support were catered for in mainstream schools. Additional advice and assistance was available from ESL project officers at LMERC as well as through the New Arrivals Kit and funding to schools in non-metropolitan areas through the Isolated ESL Student Support Program.

#### The New Arrivals Kit

Schools in non-metropolitan and outer metropolitan areas where isolated new arrivals enrolled were provided with a New Arrivals Kit. This kit consists of a selection of appropriate resources, sent to schools upon request. In 1997, New Arrival Kits were made available to 35 primary schools (for 80 students) and 8 secondary colleges (for 19 students). During 1997, the Department of Education developed the publication 'Beginning English, Support Materials for Primary New Arrivals' which is provided free to schools with isolated new arrivals. The kits, and advice about their use, can be obtained from the ESL project officers at LMERC.

### **Program Summary**

A total of 68.6 per cent of secondary new arrivals and 36.5 per cent of primary new arrivals accessed some form of provision through the New Arrivals Program. Table 1 provides a summary of the numbers of students accessing the different new arrival programs.

# GENERAL SUPPORT PROGRAMS FOR ESL IN MAINSTREAM SCHOOLS

In 1997 mainstream schools were provided with ESL Index Funding and funding for Multicultural Education Aides to support students from language backgrounds other than English.

### **ESL Index Funding**

ESL Index Funding is allocated to schools to provide ESL programs. Funding in 1997 was based on data collected in the 1996 Language Background Other Than English Census conducted in all government schools. As not all students from language backgrounds other than English require specific ESL teaching, two criteria were used to eliminate those students who do not require assistance, namely:

- · those for whom English is the main language spoken at home
- students who have been in an Australian school for more than 7 years.

Using these criteria, in 1997, 43 729 of a total of 123 020 students from language backgrounds other than English were identified as requiring ESL teaching.


A weighted formula, that reflects both the length of time in an Australian school and the stage of schooling, was then applied to the students identified. Schools were required to meet a funding threshold of \$9600 for primary and \$18 500 for secondary before being eligible for ESL Index Funding. Refer to Appendix 4 for the ESL Index Funding levels, weightings and rates used for 1997.

#### Allocation of resources

A total of just over \$21 million was allocated to 449 schools in 1997 to provide ESL programs, with approximately \$9 300 000 being allocated to 337 primary schools and approximately \$11 600 000 to 112 secondary colleges. For a listing of schools that received ESL Index Funding in 1997 refer to Appendix 5 for primary schools and Appendix 6 for secondary schools.

### Regional Distribution of ESL Index Funding

Figure 13 shows the distribution of ESL Index Funding to each of the regions for both primary and secondary schools.

### **ESL Programs in Mainstream Schools**

There are several possible models for the organisation of ESL programs in mainstream schools. The choice of model depends on such factors as:

- students' age and maturity
- students' length of time in Australia and in Australian schools
- students' exposure to English and prior instruction in English
- students' previous education
- students' fluency and literacy in their first and/or other languages
- students' fluency and literacy in English
- the nature of students' first language, including the script
- students' migration or refugee experiences
- students' cultural background
- the wishes of the students and their parents
- any specific learning difficulties of students
- the students' residential status and the duration of their proposed stay in Australia.

The following broad program types were used by schools to describe their ESL programs in the annual ESL Survey in 1997:

- Direct intensive instruction that is, direct intensive ESL teaching in similar-needs classes, including transition classes for students who have recently exited from an ELS/C in which content from the mainstream program is taught by the ESL teacher.
- Team teaching that is, team teaching and/or support teaching where ESL and mainstream teachers plan and teach together.
- Bilingual instruction that is, sustained teaching of subject content in the home language and in English.
- Other programs not covered by the above.

### **Programs in Primary Schools**

Three hundred and nine (309) primary schools received ESL Index Funding in 1997 and completed the 1997 ESL Survey.

Thirteen of the schools indicated they did not offer an ESL program and 4 schools indicated that they addressed ESL needs through mainstream classes. The following calculations and information are based on information provided by the 292 primary schools that offered an ESL program.





Figure 14 Primary program types, by region, government schools, Victoria, 1997.

Direct Intensive instruction (53.0 per cent) and Team Teaching (37.0 per cent) instruction were the preferred program types for the majority of schools. Figure 14 shows a breakdown of program types for metropolitan regions and non-metropolitan regions.

### **Primary ESL Teacher Qualifications**


There were 721 teachers involved in delivering ESL programs in the 309 primary schools that completed the ESL Survey, 89.4 per cent of teachers having no ESL qualification while 10.0 per cent had an ESL qualification and 0.6 per cent were studying for an ESL qualification. (In the non-metropolitan regions, only 7 per cent of teachers involved in delivering programs had an ESL qualification.) Figure 15 shows the percentage of teachers with an ESL qualification, those currently studying for an approved ESL qualification and those with no ESL qualification. Figure 16 provides information on qualifications by region.

A further 74 teachers were reported as having ESL qualifications but not involved in the ESL program and an additional 9 teachers were undertaking an ESL qualification but were not involved in their school's ESL program.

Information was not collected from schools that did not receive ESL Index Funding and that had teachers with ESL qualifications.

### **Programs in Secondary Schools**

One hundred and seven (107) secondary schools received ESL Index Funding in 1997 and completed the 1997 ESL Survey.

Two of the schools indicated that they did not offer an ESL program. The following calculations and information are based on information provided by the 105 secondary schools offering an ESL program.





Figure 17 Secondary program types, by region, government schools, Victoria, 1997.

Almost 77 per cent of secondary ESL programs were Direct Intensive programs, followed by Team Teaching with 13.7 per cent and Other with 9.1 per cent. Figure 17 shows a percentage breakdown of program types by region.


### Secondary ESL Teacher Qualifications

There were 552 teachers involved in delivering ESL programs in the 107 secondary colleges that completed the ESL Survey, with 66.8 per cent of teachers having ESL qualifications while 32.3 per cent did not have an ESL qualification and 0.9 per cent were studying for an ESL qualification. Figure 18 shows the percentage of teachers with ESL qualifications, those currently studying for an approved ESL qualification and those with no ESL qualifications. Figure 19 provides information on qualifications of teachers by region.

A further 123 teachers were reported as having ESL qualifications but not involved in the ESL program and one additional teacher was undertaking an ESL qualification but was not involved in their school's ESL program.

### ESL Student Types

The ESL Survey requests information on the types of ESL learners in ESL programs based on length of time in Australia and previous educational background.

Table 2 provides a description of the student types used on the survey and shows the percentage of students in each of the four student types for both primary and secondary students.

### **Multicultural Education Aides (MEAs)**

Funding is also provided to some schools for the employment of MEAs to assist with communication between the school and parents of students from language backgrounds other than English. MEAs also provide classroom assistance to students for whom English is a second language. They were allocated to schools on the basis of submissions made by schools in 1992.




Figure 20 Distribution of MEAs to government schools, by region, Victoria, 1997.

A total of 235.8 EFT MEA positions were funded in 244 educational settings in 1997. A majority of MEAs are located in the metropolitan regions as can be seen in Figure 20, which shows the distribution of MEAs (EFT) by region for 1997. Refer to Appendix 7 for a listing of all schools

receiving MEA funding in 1977. Figure 21 shows the number of schools receiving MEA funding by region.





Figure 22 Distribution of MEAs to government schools, by school type, Victoria, 1997.

MEAs, in terms of EFT, are distributed between 153 primary and 68 secondary schools, with smaller numbers located in other educational settings. Refer to Figure 22 which shows the distribution of MEAs (EFT) by school type and Figure 23 which shows the number of schools receiving MEA funding by school type.





Figure 24 Distribution of MEAs to government schools, by language, Victoria, 1997.

Additional information concerning MEAs was requested in the 1997 ESL Survey for the first time. Figure 24 shows the main languages spoken by MEAs. Refer to Appendix 8 for a listing of all main languages spoken by MEAs. Of the 426 MEAs recorded in the ESL Survey, 303 MEAs spoke two languages (including English), 73 MEAs spoke three languages, 38 MEAs spoke four languages and 12 MEAs spoke five or more languages.

MEAs spent most of their time, 64 per cent, in classrooms supporting ESL students and a further 18 per cent supporting individual ESL students. Refer to Figure 25 for a breakdown of the types of programs MEAs support in schools.



**Figure 23** Number of government schools receiving MEA funding, by school type, Victoria, 1997.
